


Introduction

On April 4th, 2019 River LA hosted an informational community meeting to solicit input into the Upper LA River & Tributaries (ULART) Revitalization Plan. The role of River LA is to conduct community outreach for this planning effort. Prior to the meeting, River LA used a variety of communication methods to promote the meeting. Approximately 65 community members attended the meeting.

Station 1: Tell us where you live





Station 4: Storytelling


Community members were asked to share a memorable experience along/in the river. Below is a summary of key ideas taken from the videos that were recorded and stories that were written on the comment cards.


The community members who attended this meeting had a lot to say about their vision for the river that runs through their city. Many people noted that their interactions with the river as children had a great impact on their views today, and thought it was important to include river-based education in our school curriculums to promote continued environmental stewardship. Residents that saw the river as a public resource thought there should be more advertisement for the opportunities to bike, hike, kayak, and birdwatch at the river. Though there were very real concerns about balancing safety and accessibility when considering development in residential areas along the river, other residents saw an opportunity to connect communities with better accessibility through connected trails and bike paths along the river and tributaries. In general, residents shared that they see their river as something that provides many benefits to their community and recognize the value in improving and maintaining it so that it may be enjoyed in similar ways by future generations.


